Phones at school

At our September P&C meeting some parents expressed concern about the prevalence of mobile phones in schools and what can be done to get students away from screens. The larger concern was around groups of students who spend their lunch times on devices rather than being active or socialising. It is understood that the Department of Education is considering a systemic approach in high schools. We will be looking at research on best practice around this and gathering data in the school about phone usage so that the school can best respond to this concern.

FAREWELL LETTER FROM THE YEAR 12 DEPUTY: MS TAOUBE

Dear Year 12 and Parents/Carers,

When I first met the Class of 2022 three years ago, they were little more than gangly, awkward teens, brimming with confidence and filled with the aspirations of youth. And then an ugly reality called COVID reared its head, dashing expectations and forcing us to reassess the learning experience. In fact, it changed the educational landscape for all of us - teachers, parents and students. Separating us through the virtual screen was a challenge. Separating us through the restrictions on social interactions was a challenge. Separating us for an uncertain amount of time... that changed with the wind oftentimes... was a challenge. My emails were full; my office was empty, bereft of all the usual flow of dialogue from random Year 12 students entering and exiting.

But then we came back. And so did the smiles and the laughter and the... annoying habits. No, this is a realistic letter. And you can cancel me all you like... be outraged as much as you like... but I will still tell it how it is.

For a cohort that had been through the COVID years, you bounced back with amazing resilience and humour. There were moments of intense anxiety amongst you, but I saw the hand of a friend that landed on your shoulder, or the concern of a teacher's referral on our communication platform to ask the Year Adviser or me to check in on you. There were moments of great frustration as you left some assessments to the last minute or clogged/interrupted/damaged the library printers with the English assessment that all 143 students had due at the same time. There were moments of great tension as you developed a campaign against opening the toilets up to you again; the glossy PowerPoint presentations, the cartoonish displays of vaping and the creative solutions you came up with would make a political lobbyist proud. You hated, you loved, you LIKED, you groaned and moaned, you threatened and cajoled... you inhaled the human experience.

Over 150 illness/misadventure forms were handed in ...COVID lingered on the edge of your lives. You did your mandatory seven days and then you returned. You returned to more assessments and more Major Works. You returned to chicken wings at the canteen and Pancake Day. When we saw the speed and gusto at which you immersed yourself in The Amazing Race, we were reminded of a pre-Covid time - you appeared free and frivolous but deeply competitive. God helped whoever got in front of you that day! Trivia Night was the same; I could hear the roar and cheers of groups from my office when you were in the Hall, and it seduced me out of the workload on my desk and dumped me into the reality that the teachers were going to lose that night.

The displays of talent that I saw emerging from this year's group were varied and prolific. The CAPA and TAS Showcases showed the level of sheer hard work and determination that went into your success. Performances that were industry worthy and projects that were beyond your year level were promoted by proud teachers and head teachers. There was clearly something special about this year's group. Reading the reports and observing the comments from each of your teachers led me to the same conclusion. Those who worked hard, who never gave up, who collaborated with others - they would see success. They DID see success.

Success can be such a loaded word, so let me explain. We see academic success in the form of Band 6s and Band 5s, but there is more to it than that. The real success for us is the inspirational stories of students who have risen and grown beyond what they were like in the beginning of the year, who have maintained their academic success despite going through trials and hardships, and who have sustained their determination because they want to do better than their last success. Every student has a different story with a different conflict and the ending is not yet written - your actions will dictate that end. As one of the finest men, George Clooney, states: 'It is more fun to be the painter than the paint.' Pick up your paintbrush and bring about your success.

I would like to thank the parents and carers of the Class of 2022 because, although some of your children will believe that they went through this year without your help, the reality is that you heard it ALL from them and still decided to keep them. The tears, the fears, the worries and the joys... sometimes that only comes out in the private world of home. The conversations you had, or those you avoided having, the reassurance and the prodding - we shared all this with you, but whereas we knew this had a time limit, you knew and felt its permanency in the home. We appreciate your support and celebrate your success in nurturing your child and guiding them towards graduation.

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This cohort has been served immensely well by Mr Dawson, a Year Adviser who has worked alongside me through the pains and the pleasures of Year 12 achievements and dramatics. Some students will never know the depth of his invisible work and the hours he spent devoted to your cause. Priming the mural when everyone else had gone home deserves him a gold medal alone. Keeping students in line through his no-nonsense statements on Google Classroom and reminding them of being responsible if they want something to happen - gold. Mr Dawson gets to graduate with Year 12 as part of the school's Honour Roll of classy teachers and Year Advisers.

I wish all of you the best in the next chapter of your stories, whether it is TAFE, university, apprenticeships, employment, deferring for reasons unknown, or staying in your parents' basement until you are evicted. Remember that success is realised in different ways but each time it occurs, you work hard for it. Be wary of any success that comes easy.

So long, farewell, Year 12.

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Sticks and Stones: Wellbeing Incursion

On Thursday 15 September 2022, Brainstorm Productions visited Tempe High School to perform "Sticks and Stones" for Years 7, 8 and 9 respectively.

TAS - Technology and Applied Studies

Design and Technology Major Works

This year we saw a wide array of design projects and design disciplines being practised, including architecture, product design and industrial design. The students presented their year's work including an 80 page folio, multiple iterations and early prototypes, a presentation video and their completed project to the NESA markers. We are extremely proud of the efforts made by all design and technology students; the quality of the design projects as a whole was outstanding.

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY MAJOR WORKS

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Year 10 iSTEM Aerodynamics

Students from Year 10 iSTEM have completed final testing of their aerodynamically designed glider wings.

Natalie S and Ann L were victorious in final testing, with their glider soaring for 7.2 metres. All students in the class have performed exceptionally well. Flight testing was stable and smooth with most students achieving flights of five to six metres. During the unit, students were trained in the use of advanced CAD software and Computational Fluid Dynamics which has allowed students to simulate the lift and drag forces acting on their wings before they move to final production. Students were also given the opportunity to experiment using the PowerUp 4.0 Remote controlled gliders, where students would use an app on their phones to pilot and gain data on the performance of their wings.

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Science

It has been another busy term in Science.

The highlight of the term was the Year 9 Science Fair. Our best research projects were judged and a 1st, 2nd and 3rd place was awarded as well as a People's Choice Award as voted for by Year 8 students, and finally the "I just wanted to know" prize.

We are so fortunate to have a judge like Richard Vickery who has a PhD in Physiology and is a neuroscientist working in sensory neuroscience, neural coding, and bionic prosthetics. He is an Associate Professor in the School of Medical Sciences at UNSW Sydney and does his research at Neuroscience Research Australia.

Richard teaches medicine and science students. Richard organises our scientists. This year, joining Richard, we had Nisha Duggan, a PhD in Chemistry in organic chemistry and chemical biology, related to developing new therapies for the treatment of stroke, in particular using spider venom to design new drugs. She is the Communications and Engagement Officer for The ARC Centre of Excellence for Innovations in Peptide and Protein Science at Sydney University. Our third judge was Mark Staples, a PhD in Computer Science and Chief Technology Officer at the Digital Finance Cooperative Research Centre. His research is in software engineering, software architecture, and blockchain, and he is a co-author of the book *Architecture for Blockchain Applications*.









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Mark represents Australia in the international standardization committee on blockchain ISO/TC 307, and in 2019 was the acting director of the Data Standards Body for the Consumer Data Right (Open Banking). Without these volunteers we would not be able to run our science day, so I would like to extend my sincere thanks for their willingness to hang out with us at Tempe High School.

Part one of the day was our three guests presenting to the Year 10 students. They outlined their careers and followed this up with a Q and A session, fielding some very interesting questions. They then spent the next two periods judging the projects, at times immersed in the chaos of school as Year 8 filed through so they could see the process and vote on People's Choice.

Finally the Year 11 Earth and Environmental science class were running practical experiments looking at ways to overcome erosion due to water run off.

Introducing the ARCO

What is an Anti-Racism Contact Officer?

An Anti-Racism Contact Officer (ARCO) is a teacher nominated by the Principal who assists in leading anti-racism education in the school. The ARCO assists the Principal by providing:

- support to build staff understanding of the impact of racism on student learning and wellbeing
- advice to students and staff on how to respond when they see or hear incidents of racism
- advice on what strategies the school can implement to address racism.

The ARCO is trained to provide advice to parents and carers, and teachers and students about the procedure for resolving complaints about racism. If requested, the ARCO can also act as a support person or advocate during the complaints resolution process.

The new ARCO for Tempe High School is **Ms Kim Salisbury**. Ms Salisbury has completed the mandatory ARCO training.

School Visitor Check-Ins



To improve the ability to register visitors at school sites, the NSW Department of Education (DOE) has engaged Service NSW to develop a digital School Check-in tool for participating NSW government schools.

The School Check-in tool is necessary to:

- Support school's obligations around security, probity, record-keeping and compliance when visitors enter schools;
- Digitise visitor sign-ins at Department of Education schools; and
- Assist NSW Health COVID-19 contact tracing, when required.

The School Check-in tool will be available as:

- Part of the Service NSW Mobile app;
- A self-serve Service NSW web check-in; and
- A concierge assisted Service NSW web check-in.

School Travel Passes

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> their details as soon as possible. Parents and students 16 years and older will need to apply for a transport Opal card themselves via the website at <u>https://transportnsw.info/school-travel-apply</u>. To complete the form online;

- The form will need to be completed in one session; you will not be able to save a partly completed form.
- You will need a valid email address.
- Note down your N or UN number.
- Applications must be made by a parent or legal guardian if the student is under 16 years of age.
- The student needs to complete and submit the application form if they are 16 years or older.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.



Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Terms of Use

Students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the Opal terms of use.

All students are required to comply with the <u>Student code of conduct</u>. The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.
